

CURRICULUM NEWS



MUSIC PROGRAM ADDS MUSIC INDUSTRY CONCENTRATION

The <u>Music Department</u> now offers three concentrations under its <u>bachelor of arts</u> in music degree. In addition to the previously offered general and performance concentrations, students can now pursue a concentration in music industry, which blends the creative and business aspects of today's evolving music landscape into a new and progressive program.

Students will gain insight into the music industry through myriad course offerings designed to foster the creation and promotion of a professional portfolio. The curriculum prepares students to become well-versed in the skills of a twenty-first-century music maker and includes courses that explore copyright law, music licensing, digital distribution, live performance, social media, artist management, and private instrument instruction. The concentration also emphasizes hands-on experience with industry-standard tools like digital audio workstations, studio time with professional-grade equipment, and portfolio-building opportunities and internships.

The concentration requires an audition, but prospective students who do not yet play an instrument, have formal training, or read music are encouraged to reach out to the department, which will work with them to build prerequisite skills for acceptance into the program.

PSYCHOLOGY REVISES B.A. AND B.S. PROGRAMS

The Psychology Department has revised both the bachelor of arts (B.A.) and bachelor of science (B.S.) programs beginning in fall 2024. Any student entering after fall 2024 will matriculate under these new program requirements. Any student admitted prior to fall 2024 will continue under the previous degree requirements unless they request to switch to the new 2024 degree requirements.

The Psychology Department offers a B.A. in applied psychology and a B.S. in psychological science. The two degrees are designed to fit different student needs.

 The B.A. in applied psychology degree requires 36 credit hours in psychology. The B.A. is focused on serving students who would like to pursue applied careers in psychology and related fields. It is designed to give students more experience in the field, greater skill at evaluating and using scientific data (rather than generating those data), and increased training in professional skills.

• The B.S. in psychological science degree requires 42 credit hours in psychology. The B.S. degree is designed for students interested in a more traditional path in psychology that is geared towards research-focused careers and graduate study. As a result, B.S. students are required to engage in an extra three credits in either research or internship-based courses. In addition, an honors B.S. degree is offered for those who qualify.

All students enter the Psychology
Department through the B.A. program in applied psychology. Students may enter the B.S. program in psychological science following the completion of PSY 350 Statistics with a minimum grade of B- (requires a change of major form submitted to the Psychology Department).

ANTHROPOLOGY: SALMA AKTHER

Originally from Bangladesh, Salma Akther earned a B.A. in anthropology with a minor in forensic anthropology while maintaining a 4.0 GPA. She served as secretary and vice president of the Anthropology Society. Highlights of Salma's academic career included her honors thesis studying the capuchin monkeys at the Buffalo Zoo and her internship at the International Institute, where she was an employment intern. Her multilingual skills and own experience as an immigrant allowed her to support clients as they navigate unfamiliar environments. Salma's future goal is to work with local organizations to provide services to immigrants to help them settle into their new lives.

ART AND DESIGN: JULIE BENHOFF



Julie Benhoff graduated with a B.F.A. in painting and a cumulative GPA of 4.0. A frequent award and scholarship recipient, Julie was juried in several Art and Design Department student exhibitions

at Buffalo State University. She is interested in painting and other forms of art, specifically representational portraits done in oil. Julie plans to continue her pursuit of painting.

ARTS AND LETTERS: ARMANDO GIANGRECO-MAROTTA



Armando, who is from Lancaster, New York, studied media production and theater at Buffalo State. He enjoyed being a part of many clubs on campus. He served on the Casting Hall Productions executive

board as the marketing manager, combining his love for theater and creating media. He had a similar role at WBNY 91.3 FM, Buffalo State's radio station, as the promotions director. In his free time, he enjoys spending time outdoors and creating anything from media to woodworking. Armando, who also interned at WNED PBS, has a strong interest in the media production field and would like to pursue a career working behind the scenes in television or radio.

The School of Arts and Sciences includes 19 departments and multiple degree-granting interdisciplinary units covering a vast and diverse array of disciplines. At the 2024 Dean's Award Ceremony, each department recognized an outstanding 2024 graduate who excelled academically and earned the nomination of the faculty in their departments. These students-now young alumni-represent excellence honed at Buffalo State.

BIOLOGY: NIKKITA LAIDLAW

A Muriel A. Howard Honors Program student, Nikkita Laidlaw graduated from Buffalo State with a B.A. in biology and a minor in mathematics. Her overall GPA was 3.92. In addition to her outstanding academic performance in traditional classroom and laboratory-based courses, Nikkita completed a biology honors research project titled, "Temperature, soil moisture, and plant growth influence soil carbon dioxide and methane fluxes" with the goal of better understanding how plants and climate influence soil greenhouse gas emissions. To address her research objectives, she conducted a greenhouse experiment to measure carbon dioxide and methane emissions from wetland microcosms she designed

and built. Nikkita presented the results of this research at Buffalo State's 2024 Student Creativity and Research Celebration. She plans to pursue a career in natural resource management and conservation.



CHEMISTRY: JILLIAN TUNG



Jillian Tung grew up in Wichita, Kansas, and began working towards her degree in chemistry at Buffalo State in 2020. She completed her requirements for both the American Chemical Society (ACS)-certified bachelor

of science in chemistry degree and minor in legal studies. Jillian worked on a research project on the characterization of gold particles using Raman and UV/Visible Spectroscopy under the guidance of Dr. Jinseok Heo. She was the recipient of numerous department awards, including the Chemistry Department Equity and Diversity Student Award, Margaret Dupre Award, Dr. Surjit Singh Memorial Award, ACS Organic Award, ACS Inorganic Award, ACS Undergraduate Physical Chemistry Award, ACS Distinguished Student Award, American Institute of Chemists Award, Edward Schulman Memorial Award, Saul Barron Memorial Award, Albert A. Himmel Memorial Award, Iota Sigma Pi Award, and Phi Lambda Upsilon Award. Jillian plans to attend graduate school for her Ph.D. in nuclear chemistry.

COMMUNICATION: MICHAEL MASTERS-HOLLER



Michael Masters-Holler graduated as a media production major with a 3.94 GPA. He transferred to Buffalo State from Niagara County Community College in 2021. Michael is also a six-year

veteran of the U.S. Navy and the recipient of an Achievement Medal from the Navy and Marine Corps, as well as both a Commendation Medal and Achievement Medal from Joint Service. He holds

certificates from the U.S. Navy Imagery Interpretation School in interpretation of satellite images and the U.S. Navy Operational Intelligence School in public speaking and presentation of data. He completed an internship in media production at Buffalo Toronto Public Media (WNED), where he worked on the USA Wheelchair Football League Tournament Games and the Brave Spaces Series. He was the co-general manager of WBNY 91.3 FM, and acted as co-host and producer of the Local Show, a live showcase of WNY musical artists. He hosted 25 live-on-air hour-long performances, and additionally live-mixed numerous musical performances for that radio program. He also worked as a producer on the music video, "There is Power," which was produced in a media production service-learning course along with local musician Michael Solo Farrow and won an Award of Excellence at the Broadcast Education Association's Student Festival of Media Arts.



ECONOMICS AND FINANCE: ANTHONY DINDERSKI

Anthony Dinderski, who graduated from Lancaster High School with his Regents diploma with honors, chose to pursue a college education at Buffalo State in the Muriel A. Howard Honors Program. Maintaining a 3.86 GPA, she made the Dean's List her entire tenure at Buffalo State. She interned with Say Yes Buffalo, assisting high schoolers in completing their financial aid and other scholarships applications. She assistant-directed the department's production of Eric Overmeyer's On the Verge and wrote a 60-page television pilot script titled Echoes of Dolls that she submitted to the Writers Guild of America (WGA), for which she received WGA certification. Zoe worked as script supervisor on The Wrong Road, a short film written by Buffalo State alumnus and Emmy Award-winning writer Tom Fontana, and edited the music video, "There Is Power" by musician MYQ Farrow. Zoe successfully auditioned and is now eligible for the highly selective and prestigious summer- and semester-long residencies at the National Theater Institute's Eugene O'Neill Theater Center in Connecticut. Dedicated to the theater community, she has mentored and inspired fellow students and aspiring actors through her role as a summer teaching artist at Shea's Performing Arts Center in Buffalo. Finally, Zoe was the recipient of Buffalo State's President's Medal for Outstanding Undergraduate Student, as her mother was before her, and she was featured as the student speaker at the School of Arts and Sciences commencement
